

COVID-19 Vaccine Resources: What Partners Need to Know Now Friday, January 15th

As COVID-19 vaccines begin rolling out across the country, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) is taking action to protect the health and safety of our nation's patients and providers and keeping you updated on the latest COVID-19 resources from HHS, CDC and CMS.

What can you do right now to help promote vaccine safety and encourage Medicare beneficiaries to get vaccinated when they have the opportunity?

1) Shared Goals:

We all want to fight COVID spread and get to a place where the people we serve can get back to normal, to do this we need to continue the <u>3Ws</u> (Wear, Wait, Wash) and <u>promote vaccinations</u> – especially among those who are hesitant.

2) Share Information with Medicare Beneficiaries: Once the COVID-19 vaccine becomes available to you:

- You will need 2 doses of the COVID-19 vaccine for it to be effective. When you receive your first dose, make sure to schedule your second dose.
- Medicare covers the COVID-19 vaccine, so there will be no cost to you.

- State governments are handling the distribution of COVID-19 vaccines. <u>Look for updates from your state and local officials</u> as more doses of the vaccine become available for additional priority groups.
- Visit <u>CDC.gov</u> for additional trustworthy information on the COVID-19 vaccines.

3) Encourage Medicare Beneficiaries to get the vaccine:

- The vaccine will help keep you from getting COVID-19. Learn more about the benefits of the vaccine.
- Did you know that COVID-19 vaccines will not give you COVID-19? They will also not cause you to test positive on COVID-19 viral tests. <u>Learn</u> more facts about COVID-19 vaccines.
- Once it is your turn to get vaccinated, here's <u>what to expect after</u> receiving a COVID-19 vaccine.
- After Vaccination: A couple of things to keep in mind:
- Side effects can be similar to the flu symptoms, but they should go away in a few days.
- Your body will need time to fully develop protection once you've been vaccinated, just like any other vaccine.
- Continue to practice the 3Ws even after vaccination. Cover your mouth and nose with a mask when around others, stay at least 6 feet away from others, avoid crowds, and wash your hands often.
